## Why Democracy is Not the Answer for China

In the view of our speaker, Eric Li, Western-style democracy is not an absolute value, and is not necessarily suitable to all countries at all times. While the modern West sees democracy and human rights as the pinnacle of human development -- a belief premised on an absolute faith -- China is on a different path. China's leaders are prepared to allow greater popular participation in political decisions if and when it is conducive to economic development and favorable to the country's national interests, and have in fact done so in the past 10 years. Democracy should be seen as a means to a specific end, effective political governance, and not as an end in itself.

**Eric Li** is the Founder and Managing Director of <u>Chengwei Capital</u>, and also a frequent contributor to leading publications such as the New York Times, the Huffington Post, the South China Morning Post, the Christian Science Monitor, and Global Times.
