

The story of Sino-Hollywood courtship is one of competing cultural and business values and development models, as well as nationalism and cultural exceptionalism. The ups and downs of this courtship tell an intrigue of blockbuster scale -- a scandal-ridden roller-coaster ride that promises endless entertainment, much like Hollywood itself. Zhu Ying will discuss the complex commercial logic and cultural dynamics that make the Sino-Hollywood courtship an intriguing case study of political, cultural, and economic clash and cooptation on a global scale.

Zhu Ying is Professor of Media Culture at the City University of New York (CUNY) and leading scholar in Chinese cinema and media studies. Her publications have appeared in prominent film and media journals, edited book volumes, and websites/blogs in the U.S., China, and Europe. The recipient of fellowships from the *National Endowment for the Humanities* and the *American Council of Learned Societies*, she is the author and editor of seven books, including Chinese Cinema During the Era of Reform: Ingenuity of the System (2003) and Television in Post-Reform China: Serial Drama, Confucian Leadership, and the Global Television Market (2008), TV China (2009), and Art, Politics and Commerce in Chinese Cinema (2010), and Two Billion Eyes: The Story of China Central Television (2012). She has also produced two documentaries, Google China Standoff, and China: Cartier to Confucius, shown on Netherlands Public Television.
