

Female Education in the Age of One Child Families

Thirty-five years after the introduction of China's Family Planning Policy Western commentators remain critical of its effects on women. But are these criticisms still as valid as they once were?

Informed by ethnographic fieldwork in rural Shanxi Province,
Natasha Robinson looks at how the lives of Chinese women are
changing in the absence of siblings and explores what this means for
China's modernization.
