

## Lessons of History not Learned: The Rise of the Far Right in Europe

16:15 – Doors Open 16:30 – Lecture 17:15 – Q&A In <u>The Eternal Return of Fascism</u>, Rob Rieman contends that fascism is a constant presence in our societies, and that it inevitably leads to despotism and violence. To combat it, we must first acknowledge its presence. Expanding on the ideas of Thomas Mann, Nietzsche, Albert Camus, Primo Levi, and Spinoza, Riemen describes how conditions in modern society allow for fascism to live on. He illustrates how increasing aggression towards others and the weakness and cowardice of resentful people lead to a deep-seated fear of freedom and need to conform to the masses. As Albert Camus once wrote, "...the secret of Europe is that it no longer loves life." Only in such a society can fascist politics blossom once again. Only once we discover our love for life and decide to devote ourselves to what truly gives life – truth, goodness, beauty, friendship, justice, compassion and wisdom – only then will we be resistant to fascism.

Rob Riemen is a Dutch author and public intellectual, and the founder, president, and CEO of the Nexus Institute, a think tank in the Netherlands that studies the European cultural heritage in its social, philosophical, and artistic context, and aims to provide insight into contemporary issues and shape our cultural and philosophical debate. Riemen's recent books include The Eternal Return of Fascism (2011) and Nobility of Spirit: A Forgotten Ideal (2008), among his many other books and publications, and he has been lecturer at the Aspen's Institute's Festival of Ideas.
