Relations between China and Japan have been fraught with tensions that have waxed and waned since China's economic opening, even as economic ties and tourism have grown between the two neighbors. China's increasing international and economic clout has shifted the balance of power in Asia-Pacific, and the future of this development is still uncertain. Consul General of Japan to Shanghai, Kazuyuki Katayama will discuss the changing nature of Sino-Japan relations, given the shifting dynamics between China and its neighbors. He will discuss the obstacles as well bridges that bring these two countries tied by history and geography closer together or further apart.

Kazuyuki Katayama is the **Consul General of Japan in Shanghai**. He holds a BA in Law from Kyoto University, MA from Harvard University, and PhD from University of Malaya. He has also studied at CUHK, Beijing Language Institute, Peking University, and Stanford University. As a career diplomat, he has served in Hong Kong, Beijing, Washington DC, Kuala Lumpur and Brussels, and was Consul General in Detroit his post in Shanghai. Within theMinistry of Foreign Affairs, he was at the China Desk twice, and served as Director of Energy Resources Division and as Director of Cultural Affairs.
