

Global Cyberpower: The U.S., China, and the Future of the Internet

Over the past twenty-five years, digital technologies have profoundly affected global power through the implications for military technology, commerce, communications, trade, education and finance. Due in part to its technological lead, the U.S. has been able to shape Internet technology in such a way as to promote its national interest and it has done so very successfully. China's lead in some of the technologies that will be fundamental to the next wave of innovation, particularly the Internet of Things, suggests that it will play a more significant role in terms of global technological leadership in the next tweny-five years than it has done previously. What lessons can be learned from the US experience in conceptualising a globally connected world? This talk offers a historical perspective and also some points for consideration in the future.

Madeline Carr is Senior Lecturer in International Relations at Cardiff University. Her research looks at the ways in which new technology both reinforces and disrupts conventional frameworks for understanding International Relations and the implications of this for state and global security, order and governance. Madeline has published on cyber norms, Internet Freedom, multistakeholder Internet governance, and the public/private partnership in national cyber security strategies, and her book U.S. Power and the Internet in International Relations (2016) is published with Palgrave MacMillan. Madeline is a co-lead on the Standards, Governance and Policy stream of the UK's £10M PETRAS research hub on the cyber security of the Internet of Things. She was selected in 2014 for the Welsh Crucible as a future research leader and is a multi-award winning teacher. Madeline is on the executive committee for the newly established ISA section STAIR (Science, Technology and Arts in International Relations) and is the 2017 co-program chair.
