# China and Africa: Past History and Current Prospects

Tonight's talk will examine the complexity of China's historical relationship with Africa, based on the book by the speakers, <u>China and Africa: A Century of Engagement</u>. Topics discussed will include the history of China's relations with the continent, looking back past the establishment of the People's Republic of China in 1949, as well as the broad range of areas that define this relationship—politics, trade, investment, foreign aid, military, security, and culture—providing a significant historical backdrop for each. Also discussed will be prospects for the China-Africa relationship in light of its history.

<u>David Shinn</u> is former U.S. Ambassador to Burkina Faso and Ethiopia. His diplomatic career spanned 37 years in the U.S. Foreign Service, with assignments at embassies in Lebanon, Kenya, Tanzania, Mauritania, Cameroon, and Sudan. Shinn consults to the U.S. government on the Horn of Africa as well as Sino-African relations. He is Adjunct Professor of International Affairs at The George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs, author of <u>Hizmet in Africa: The Activities and Significance of the Gülen</u> <u>Movement</u> (2015), and co-author of <u>China and Africa: A Century of Engagement</u> (2012) and the <u>Historical</u> <u>Dictionary of Ethiopia</u> (2004). He holds a PhD in Political Science from George Washington University.

Joshua Eisenman is Assistant Professor at the University of Texas' LBJ School for Public Policy and Senior Fellow for China Studies at the American Foreign Policy Council in Washington, D.C. This summer he is a Visiting Professor at Fudan University's School of International and Public Relations. Eisenman holds a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of California, Los Angeles, an M.A. in international Relations from Johns Hopkins University's Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), and a B.A. in East Asian Studies from The George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs. Eisenman is co-author of <u>China and Africa: A Century of Engagement</u> (2012), and his next book will be <u>China Steps Out:</u> Beijing's Major Power Engagement toward the Developing World, to be published later this year.

<u>China Crossroads</u> hosts lectures and panels on all topics related to China, including foreign policy, business, and society, as well as those on other areas as they relate to China, the idea being that China is both already a "crossroads" of the world and itself at a "crossroads" in terms of its future global influence.
