Chinese investment across Eurasia in its Belt and Road Initiative is booming but subject to risks that are not completely understood or accounted for by Chinese companies. These include delays in approvals, unrealized deals with local governments, opposition from local workers and/or civil society, compliance with changing local laws, and various security risks including those to Chinese staff, such as kidnapping, insurgency, etc. Today's talk will discuss past, present, and future challenges, and suggest solutions.

Michael Humphreys leads the Chinese and Korean outbound investment practice for Control Risks, helping Chinese clients with their security and other investment risks throughout Eurasia. Prior to this role, he was Managing Director of Control Risks in Australia. His experience spans most industry sectors with particular expertise in the resource and construction sectors, and has also worked in Malaysia, India, and the Middle East. Prior to joining Control Risks, Michael was an officer in the Australian Army. Career highlights included commanding an infantry battalion, membership of a joint warfare think tank and secondment to the United Nations in the Middle East, where he was an advisor to the Arab-Israeli conflict management process in 2001-2002. Humphreys holds a BA in Geography from the University of New South Wales, an MA in Defence and Politics from the University of Madras, as well as an MBA from Southern Cross University.
