What are China's objectives in the developing world and how are they being pursued? This talk analyzes the features of China's rapidly expanding relations with developing countries and explains how they and other nations are responding. By considering the specific features of China's engagement in each region, we will draw cross-regional comparisons and identify common themes that span the entire developing world -- from Africa to Latin America to Central Asia. This talk should be of interest to students, scholars, and observers of Chinese foreign policy, comparative political economy, and international relations.

Joshua Eisenman is Assistant Professor at the University of Texas' LBJ School for Public Policy and Senior Fellow for China Studies at the American Foreign Policy Council in Washington, D.C. This summer he is a Visiting Professor at Fudan University's School of International and Public Relations. Eisenman holds a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of California, Los Angeles, an M.A. in international Relations from Johns Hopkins University's Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), and a B.A. in East Asian Studies from The George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs. Eisenman is co-author of China and Africa: A Century of Engagement (2012), and his next book will be China Steps Out: Beijing's Major Power Engagement toward the Developing World, to be published later this year.
