This talk will explore whether or not President Trump has a foreign policy strategy for his country. In particular it will discuss U.S. relations with Europe and China, outlining a new kind of bipolar order shaped by Washington and Beijing. This new global order may very well lead to the marginalization of most other countries.

[Klaus Larres](#) is the Richard M. Krasno Distinguished Professor in History and International Affairs at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. He also is a Senior Fellow at the Center for Transatlantic Relations at Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) in Washington, DC. Larres joined UNC Chapel Hill in January 2012, after having spent the previous two and a half years as a visiting professor at Yale and the Department of European Studies at SAIS in Washington, DC. Before moving to the U.S., Larres spent almost 18 years working and studying in the UK. He was a Professor in International Relations at the University of London, Jean Monnet Professor at Queen's University Belfast and Professor of History and International Affairs at the University of Ulster in Northern Ireland. Larres has published widely and among his book publications are [Churchill's Cold War: The Politics of Personal Diplomacy](#) (2002), [The Blackwell Companion to Europe Since 1945](#) (2009) and [The U.S. Secretaries of State and Transatlantic Relations](#) (2010). He also serves as Counselor and Senior Foreign Policy Adviser at the German Embassy in China and is currently a Visiting Professor at the Schwarzman Scholars Program at Tsinghua University.
