Brantley Turner will discuss trends and considerations in international education in China serving Chinese nationals. As a school administrator, Brantley is focused on the day-to-day reality for high school students studying in China and preparing to enter universities overseas. In her talk, she will discuss the landscape of international-readiness education in China at the policy level and the implementation level, with a lens on teaching and learning quality, character development and mental health in an outcome-driven system.

Originally from New York, Brantley has lived in China for the majority of the past 20 years. She is passionate about exchange between China and the West and is fluent in written and spoken Mandarin Chinese. A current PhD candidate at the International School of Management in Paris, Brantley holds a graduate certificate from the Hopkins-Nanjing University Center for Chinese American Studies, a B.A from Brown University. Brantley lives in Shanghai with her husband and three children.
