

2019 is the 40-year mark for US-China normalization, and bilateral relations are as complex and tense as ever. Ivan Rasmussen of NYU Shanghai will share observations from his research on U.S.-China Relations and China's Belt and Road Initiative, including his insights on the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank, the trade war, and the role of domestic audiences.

[Ivan Rasmussen](#) is an Assistant Professor of Practice in Political Science at NYU Shanghai. Prior to joining NYU Shanghai, he was a Visiting Assistant Professor of Government at Hamilton College and a Post-Doctoral Fellow with the International Security Program at the Belfer Center of Harvard's Kennedy School. Dr. Rasmussen's publications include a recent co-authored RAND report, "At the Dawn of Belt Road." He holds a BA from Princeton and PhD from Tufts University's Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.
