Our talk panelists will discuss how the U.S. election results and incoming administration will shape the future development of U.S.-China relations. In particular, the panelists will discuss what about U.S. policy toward China, and vice versa, is likely to change and what will remain the same.

Kenneth Jarrett is Senior Advisor at the Albright Stonebridge Group and the Former President of the American Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai. Previously Chairman for Greater China at APCO Worldwide, Mr. Jarrett was also a U.S. diplomat for 26 years, whose assignments included U.S. Consul General in Shanghai, Deputy Consul General in Hong Kong, and Director of Asian Affairs in the National Security Council, serving in Singapore, Manila, Beijing, Chengdu, and Washington. He holds degrees from Cornell, Yale, and the National War College and attended the Hopkins-Nanjing Center, and he is a member of the National Committee of U.S.-China Relations.

Ren Xiao is currently Professor of International Politics at the Institute of International Studies (IIS) at Fudan University, and Director of the Center for the Study of Chinese Foreign Policy. Previously he was Senior Fellow and Director of the Asia-Pacific Studies Department at Shanghai Institute for International Studies (SIIS). Dr. Ren studied in the University of Essex in England (1990-91) and held research or visiting positions at the University of Turku, Finland, Nagoya University, Japan, and The George Washington University. His work is published in Global Policy, The Pacific Review, Asia Policy, Third World Quarterly, Journal of Contemporary China, East Asia: An International Quarterly, etc. Other publications include Human Security and Cross-Border Cooperation in East Asia (co-editor, Palgrave Macmillan, 2018), New Frontiers in China's Foreign Relations (co-editor, Lexington Books, 2011) and China's Foreign Aid: Theory and Practice (2017, available in Chinese). Dr. Ren serves on the editorial boards of several international academic journals including Globalizations, Journal of Global Policy and Governance, East Asia: An International Quarterly, and East Asian Policy. Dr. Ren worked at the Chinese Embassy in Tokyo from 2010 to 2012. He received his Ph.D. in Political Science from Fudan University in 1992.

<u>China Crossroads</u> hosts talks on all topics related to China, including business, foreign policy, and other areas as they relate to China, the idea being that China is both already a "crossroads" of the world and itself at a "crossroads" in terms of its future global influence.
